Can a hybrid solar and wind power system provide reliable electric power?

This paper presents the solution to utilizing a hybrid of photovoltaic (PV) solar and wind power system with a backup battery bank to provide feasibility and reliable electric power for a specific remote mobile base station located at west arise, Oromia.

Can solar and wind provide reliable power supply in remote areas?

Solar and wind are available freely and thus appears to be a promising technology to provide reliable power supply in the remote areas and telecom industry of Ethiopia. The project aim generate and provide cost effective electric power to meet the BTS electric load requirement.

How much electricity can a solar-wind power plant generate?

Our estimates suggest that the total electricity generation from global interconnectable solar-wind potential could reach a staggering level of $[237.33 \pm 1.95] \times 10^3$ TWh/year (mean \pm standard deviation; the standard deviation is

due to climatic fluctuations).

Where do grid-boxes contain solar and wind resources?

In densely populated regions such as western Europe, India, eastern China, and western United States, most grid-boxes contain solar and wind resources apt for interconnection (Supplementary Fig. S1). Nevertheless, these regions exhibit modest power generation potential, typically not exceeding 1.0 TWh/year (Fig. 1a).

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
