What are the new energy base station projects in Kosovo

How many thermal power plants are there in Kosovo?

Kosovo's two existing thermal power plants, Kosova A and Kosova B, were built in 1963 and 1983, respectively. Despite a combined installed capacity of 1,478MW, the two plants have a current operational capacity of 915MW using 7.2 million tonnes (Mt) of coal a year.

What happened to Kosovo Power Station Unit B2?

After conflict in Kosovo in the 1990s, the European Agency for Reconstruction (EAR) invited tenders for the rehabilitation of Kosovo power station unit B2. In June 2000, the contract was won by a consortium of RWE Power International.

Who is the preferred bidder for Kosova e Re Power Project?

The Government of Kosovo and ContourGlobal jointly announced a consortium of GE companies as the preferred bidder for the engineering, procurement, and construction (EPC) and long-term maintenance (LTM) contract for the Kosova e Re power project in May 2019.

What is the estimated cost of the Kosovo B project?

The Kosovo B project is estimated to cost US\$2 billion. It also includes the development of a new lignite mine in order to meet the needs of the Kosovo B and the newly constructed power plant.
